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
## *The Illustrated Man* by Ray Bradbury

## **Reading Assignment for *The Illustrated Man* by Ray Bradbury**

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As you read the novel, **annotate** for the theme topics listed below. In addition to the theme topics, annotate your observations of Bradbury's writing style: pay close attention to the **narrators/point of view**, the **writing style changes** (with point of view changes), **setting**, and **symbols**. Annotations will be assessed the first day of class, and a literary analysis essay will follow.

### **Theme Topics for Annotations**

1. technology vs. humanity
2. individual vs. society
3. justice and injustice
4. faith and religion
5. death and meaning of life
6. allegory: cautionary tales

## **Visual Assignment for *The Illustrated Man* by Ray Bradbury**

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Pick ONE of the stories – maybe your favorite one. Think about the frame narrative that Bradbury creates at the beginning of the novel when he explains that each of the stories is actually a tattoo on “the illustrated man.” **What might that tattoo look like?**

**Create an 8.5” x 11” (same size as a piece of typing paper) visual representation of the story.** The representation should include visual elements that might be something that would appear on “the illustrated man.” Think about setting, symbols, characters, narrators, etc. as you consider what visual images might have appeared on his tattoo to represent this story. **In addition to the visual images, choose ONE quotation from the story to include on the visual representation.** The quotation should represent an important idea from the story and does not necessarily need to be a complete sentence – make it fit artistically.

You may choose to create a digital project on a PowerPoint slide, Canva, or any other program for creating digital artwork. However, you may choose to draw your own images or make a collage from printed images (from the Internet, magazines, etc.). Either way, you must bring a paper copy of your visual project to class on the first day (with your annotated novel). Digital projects should also be emailed to your teacher during the first week of school.

**A reflection/explanation must be completed with the image (on a separate sheet of paper).** Include the title of the story and an explanation of the image choices you made for the visual project.
