The camp, which is one of several Tennessee Titans Youth Football Camps held over the summer and is presented by Academy Sports, will be led by USA Football certified and Pro Sports Experience trained coaches. For the second year, Golden Tate, Class of 2007, returned to Pope John Paul II High School to host the Golden Tate Scholars Dinner and the Golden Tate Football Skills Camp June 2 and 3.

"This is one of my favorite weekends," he said during the dinner. "It's truly an honor to be here."

Golden who starred on the athletic fields of JPII before going on to success as a wide receiver at the University of Notre Dame and the National Football League, said of JPII, "It's an amazing place. Looking back, I really appreciate everything the school offers."

Golden brought along several of his teammates from the Detroit Lions to participate in the camp, including running back Ameer Abdullah, who also was the guest speaker at the dinner.

"If you believe in yourself ... good things will happen," Ameer told the crowd at the dinner, which included JPII's football, dance and cheer teams. Going into his senior year of high school and considered small in stature, he had only one scholarship offer, he said. Rather than be discouraged, his father urged him to keep driving to reach his dreams. "All you can do is maximize what you have," Ameer said. He ended up signing with the University of Nebraska and finishing his career as one of the top running backs in the storied program's long history.

MR. SABOE NAMED MODEL UN EDUCATOR OF YEAR

Paul Saboe, the advisor for the Model United Nations team at Pope John Paul II High School, has been selected as the Model UN Educator of the Year for 2016-17 by BestDelegate.com, the premier Model UN website.

"Over the past 15 years, Paul has grown the program to be the largest extra-curricular program in the school, inspiring students to participate throughout their four years in high school," said Natalie Loedon, a fellow history teacher at JPII. "In addition, he began a Model UN conference at JPII, attracting many high schools from around the Middle Tennessee region. The organization, enthusiasm, and fun Paul incorporates into the program is inspiring. He does all of this while teaching students the importance of work ethic and accountability."

This past academic year, the JPII Model UN team involved 126 students or almost 23 percent of the student body, and competed in four conferences, winning 66 awards.

In September 2016, the team sponsored the fifth annual JPII Model UN Conference for 150 delegates and topped 500 awards as a team by winning 14 awards, including four gavels.

In November, the team attended the 51st annual Arkansas Model UN

Conference and set the record for the most awards won in the over 50-year history of the conference with 36 awards, including 11 gavels and the Best Delegation Plaque for the sixth time in the last eight years.

In February 2017, the team participated in the ninth annual University of Alabama Model UN Conference and won the second most awards among competing schools with nine awards. The team finished the competition season in March at the 10th annual Miami University of Ohio Model UN Conference and won seven awards, the most awards among participating schools in the team's first time competing in this conference.

This academic year marked the first time that JPII offered a special Model UN Innov8 elective class for sophomores through seniors, enabling those students to experience Model UN simulations and to develop their writing and public speaking skills in the classroom.

KNIGHTS COMPETE IN STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS


The Pope John Paul II High School baseball team and senior track athlete Chris Bell competed in this year's Spring Fling state championships.

In the Division II-AA baseball state tournament, the top-ranked Knights dropped both of their games, 7-0 to eventual state champion Brentwood Academy and 1-0 to Briarcrest Christian School of Memphis. It was the third straight year the Knights qualified for the state tournament and the fourth time in school history, but JPII has yet to win a Spring Fling game. JPII finished the season with a 27-11 record.

In the Division II state championship track and field meet held Friday, May 26, at Middle Tennessee State University in Memphis, Bell, the only Knight to qualify for the state meet, finished sixth in the high jump. His performance placed JPII 17th in the team standings.

AFTER KATRINA, MR. PATTON FOUND HIS WAY TO JPII

After witnessing the destruction caused by Hurricane Katrina and the long, arduous task of rebuilding, Michael Patton and his wife, Donna, decided to pack up and leave their hometown of New Orleans. Their journey took him to Nashville and eventually to Pope John Paul II High School where he has been teaching since January 2013.

"JPII was always on my radar," said Mr. Patton, who taught at St. Edward School in Nashville for five years before making the move to JPII. When he would accompany St. Edward's eighth graders on visits to JPII he was impressed with the facilities. When he was in school at Archbishop Hannan High School in New Orleans, that school was about the same age as JPII, but was still struggling to add to its facilities, he noted. "JPII had it all pretty much in place," he said.

"These kids had a great opportunity," said Mr. Patton. The school provided students "every advantage that you would need."

By the time Mr. Patton arrived at JPII, he already had more than a decade's experience working in Catholic schools. After he graduated from University of Southern Mississippi his wife was hired at Archbishop Hannan as the band director. The principal also hired Mr. Patton, who is a musician and still plays in a rock band, to teach English and to help his wife with the band.

Being a teacher "had crossed my mind for several reasons," Mr. Patton said. "My wife and I had taught (religious education) classes. I knew it was something I would look into doing."

After two years at his alma mater, "I thought I was done," Mr. Patton said. "I was going to try to do sports marketing or something." Instead he got an offer to be the school librarian at an elementary School. "I could hang out with these books all day," Mr. Patton said, and he would play guitar for the students. He also taught honors English for eighth graders.

After two years, his next stop was Jesuit High School in New Orleans where he taught study skills. But then Katrina hit. "All our family members lost their houses," Mr. Patton said. He and his wife were spared

because they had sold their house in New Orleans eight months before and had moved to the country. The flooding after the hurricane left their former home under 12 feet of water, he said. "It was a year-long process of gutting relatives' houses," Mr. Patton said of the hurricane's aftermath.

He stayed in New Orleans for two more years, but after his brother, a musician, and his parents moved to Nashville, Mr. Patton and his wife, decided to move from New Orleans as well. He targeted locations on the East Coast and Nashville, and when St. Edward responded to the resume he had sent them, the Pattons packed up for Nashville, he said.

He taught eighth grade English at St. Edward for five years while also pursuing two of his other interests, music and sports. "I was writing for Yahoo Sports. During spring break in 2012, I worked all day, every day writing for Yahoo." His article about New Orleans Saints quarterback Drew Brees was put on the website's front page and received a million hits. With that taste of success, Mr. Patton decided, "I'm going to try this" as a full-time job. But his plans were stymied when Yahoo started making cutbacks. He decided to stick with teaching and landed a spot at JPII teaching English for the second semester of 2013. While at St. Edward, he had taught the children of Deacon Brian Edwards, JPII's director of pastoral care and counseling. "He always talked about what a good place to work it was."

At JPII, Mr. Patton teaches freshman English classes and also puts to use his experience with Yahoo Sports and as a fantasy football podcaster teaching an online media class. Students in the online media class "mostly do blogging, podcasting and videos," Mr. Patton said.

When the students sign up for the class, most don't consider themselves writers. "They sign up because it's fun," Mr. Patton said. But the class might be able to open up avenues for future jobs, he said. As part of the class, the students make promotional videos and through the Innov8 program, he is trying to build a relationship with the Sounds, Nashville's minor league baseball franchise, where students can work as interns in the marketing department. "That kind of experience will help them when they go looking for a job," Mr. Patton said.

During his time at JPII, Mr. Patton has found that the students are open to new experiences and are unafraid to speak or perform in front of others. "They love to discuss things," he said. "The more you can bring discussion into the classroom, the better."

BROOKS NAMED DIVISION II-AA MR. BASEBALL WINNER

Pope John Paul II High School senior Ben Brooks was named the Division II-AA Mr. Baseball by the Tennessee Baseball Coaches Association, recognizing him as the best player in the large private school classification.

Brooks also was named as the Division II-AA East/Middle Region Player of the Year for the second straight season. A four-year starter at shortstop for the Knights, Brooks has signed to play baseball collegiately at the University of Memphis.

His teammate, pitcher Mason Hickman, was one of the three finalists for

the award. Hickman, a senior, has signed to play collegiately at Vanderbilt University.

Brooks finished his senior season with a .418 batting average and a .532 on base percentage. He drove in 13 runs hitting lead-off and scored 39 runs in 38 games.

Brooks helped lead JPII to three straight appearances in the Division II-AA state tournament. This year, the Knights finished the season with a 27-11 record.
